Message from
the Founder



Helping transform a country is an ambitious goal for a private foundation. Looking back on 10 years of our work, I understand that. But I also understand that we achieved something.

Since the 1990s I started supporting education, promoting art that transforms thinking, and connecting Ukraine to the world. To give back to my country and society. 10 years ago I went from ideas and activities to a systematic approach, consolidating my social investments in a foundation.

My goal was to trigger evolutionary transformation. We selected neuralgic points to invest consistently in a new generation. This new generation, with new knowledge, global experience and European values, would transform Ukraine. To bring out the Ukraine I have always believed in: open, free, fair, tolerant, dynamic, successful, and firmly established as a pillar of Wider Europe.

Our strategic investments helped, I believe, shape a new country: thousands of scholarships, a cutting edge contemporary art center in Kyiv free of charge, international conferences on top level in Ukraine and abroad, education on Ukraine's Jewish history, a network of modern neonatal centers as a contribution to modernizing Ukraine's healthcare.

We are also proud of symbolic events, like presenting the movie "Spell your Name" on the Holocaust in Ukraine co-produced by Steven Spielberg in 2006. Or the free concerts by Elton John and Paul McCartney whom we convinced to play in Ukraine for the first time: they advocated for a tolerant united Ukraine. And they compensated Ukrainians for the Rock 'n' Roll and pop (and the freedom it stands for), which during Soviet times Ukrainians could watch only from afar.

Our success would have been impossible without our international partners. They inspired us and me personally. What I did with their help, helped me grow, too.

Most importantly: Ukraine's citizens are doing the change by themselves. They would have transformed the country anyway. I am just happy if as a citizen of my country I helped accelerate the process.

I wish I had done even more. And if I can, I will make much bigger contributions in the future.

There is no stronger driver of change than future generations empowered with knowledge and values. Therefore, to create the generation that will build a new Ukraine, we have invested in scholarships for the best Ukrainian students since 2006.

To date, over 2,000 students have received a stipend after having undergone a selection process that tests academic excellence and leadership potential. They make up the Zavtra.UA community ("zavtra" means "tomorrow" in Ukrainian).

The grantees receive a monthly stipend and also regularly attend lectures by world leaders in Kyiv, where they learn about global perspectives and receive inspiration for their own endeavors. Among others, Bill Clinton, Shimon Peres, Tony Blair, Jimmy Wales, and Muhammad Yunus have spoken to the Zavtra community. Selected alumni are also annually invited to the Yalta European Strategy forums, where they meet with global thinkers and political leaders to discuss challenges facing Ukraine and the world.

Also, we encourage the community to implement projects for social change (thus far, 160) and organize seminars to broaden their knowledge about global challenges – since 2013, three "Climate Change Camps" were organized in partnership with the Coca Cola Foundation.

— To create a new Ukraine, responsible citizens and leaders must have an excellent education. They also need practical experience of how open, democratic societies governed by the rule of law work. Since 2010, WorldWideStudies (WWS) has been giving Ukraine’s best students and young professionals access to the world’s best 200 universities, predominantly in the United States and Western Europe. In exchange, they commit to return to Ukraine and apply their newly acquired knowledge and skills in their country for at least five years.

Scholarships are awarded in fields crucial for the development of Ukraine such as public administration, public law, ecology, agriculture, aerospace engineering, and alternative energy. Grants cover up to 60% of the total amount needed to complete a Master’s program.

Since 2010, program alumni have built a community and are involved in reforming Ukraine. Three WWS grantees are current members of the Ukrainian Parliament, more than 30 grantees implement new standards in business, 15 scholarship holders work at state bodies and international organizations, others lead their own companies or NGOs or work in science.

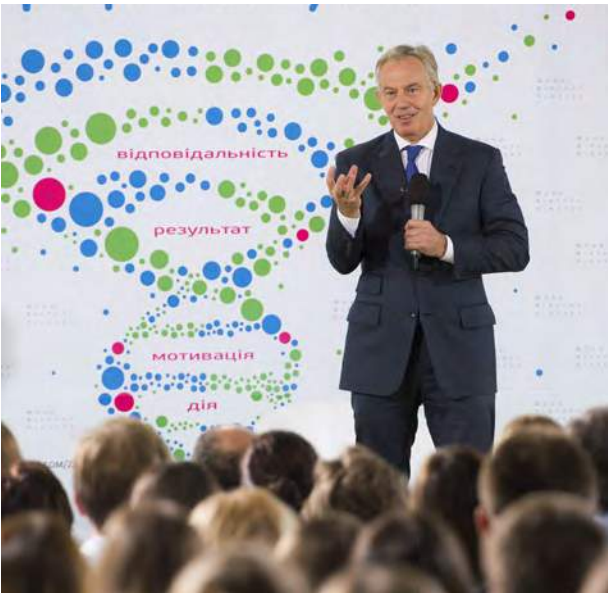

— The Kyiv School of Economics (KSE) offers internationally recognized full-time Masters Programs in Economics and Business Economics. Courses are taught in English by globally trained faculty, who have strong backgrounds in teaching and research. The program’s curriculum is modeled on renowned economic graduate programs in North America and Western Europe. KSE students graduate with a Master’s degree in economics from the University of Houston (USA).

Since KSE’s creation, 626 students have graduated. KSE graduates work in the private sector (60%), the public sector (29%) and in academia (11%). KSE alumni play a leading role in the Ukrainian National Bank and in the Ministry of Finance, in major think tanks and in major consulting companies. KSE alumni also created VoxUkraine, a powerful analytical platform that monitors the Ukrainian government and its reform progress.



In addition to teaching and research, KSE organizes Open Lectures with renowned economists, businessmen, and public figures; student competitions, case championships, master classes, conferences, academic seminars, and other events for students and professionals. In 2015, KSE launched several business education programs, including a KSE MBA program and various corporate programs.

The Victor Pinchuk Foundation has been the founding sponsor of KSE and from 2007 to 2012 supported KSE.

The Aspen Ukraine Initiative was launched in 2006 to create a network of Ukrainian leaders infused with shared values and a commitment to change society. Since then, the Aspen Ukraine community has become a unique group of Ukrainian leaders dedicated to building a new country.

To bring the approach of the Aspen Institute to Ukraine, the foundation sent a group of Ukrainians to participate in the Aspen Seminar in the United States in 2006. They then started the Aspen Ukraine “Responsible Leadership” seminars that have been held annually ever since.

The community quickly became self-sufficient: the association of Aspen Ukraine graduates funded and organized the seminars, while the Victor Pinchuk Foundation provided organizational support

The seminars gather 20 to 30 leaders from business, media, government, science, and art sectors each year. Following Aspen’s text-based dialogue method, participants discuss philosophical texts and real-world societal issues. In this neutral forum, Ukrainian leaders come to a new understanding of human values and what they mean today.

Today, in the Ukrainian parliament and government more than a dozen Aspen alumni are contributing to Ukraine’s transformation.

Aspen Ukraine seminars used to be held in Crimea. After Crimea’s annexation by the Russian Federation they moved to the Carpathian Mountains in Western Ukraine.

In November 2015, the Aspen Institute announced the launch of operations of the Aspen Institute Kyiv as part of its network of ten international partners in Europe, Latin America and Asia. The Aspen Institute is an educational and policy studies organization based in Washington, DC.

PINCHUKARTCENTRE

Over 2 million mostly young Ukrainians visited PinchukArtCentre since 2006. During a decade, PinchukArtCentre provided free access to new ideas, perceptions and emotions, bringing works of over 150 international artists to Ukraine and investing into a new generation of Ukrainian and international artists.

For 10 years, PinchukArtCentre has been the only place in Ukraine to offer a consistent program that presented major solo exhibitions and theme shows focusing on newly produced works from leading international artists, combined with a long-term commitment to nurture and support the emerging Ukrainian art scene.

Throughout this time, the art centre provided a platform for artists to foster values of freedom, democracy, individuality and critical thinking.

Through exhibitions and a dynamic public program it became a center of intellectual and artistic energy, contributing to shaping the minds of a new generation to think beyond the ordinary, empowering new generations to modernize and transform society.

The programs negotiated between national identity and international challenges. We introduced leading international artists to broad audiences.

At the same time we invested into the next generation. In 2009, the first edition of the PinchukArtCentre Prize took place, a biennial national prize presenting 20 Ukrainian artists up to 35 year old. A few months later we launched the Future Generation Art Prize, a biennial worldwide contemporary art prize, open to all artists up to 35 years old. This interlinked prize commitment serves to discover, recognize and give long-term support to a future generation. Through the biennial prizes, the PinchukArtCentre has become a leading hub for the best emerging artists worldwide and in Ukraine.

The PinchukArtCentre has also represented Ukraine at the Venice Biennale in 2007, 2009, 2015 and organized collateral events at the Biennale in 2011 and 2013.

Since November 2013, PinchukArtCentre has contributed to artists and society processing the dramatic changes in Ukraine. It gave a voice to Ukrainian artists who reflected those changes in their work. After the dramatic events in 2013/14, three young Ukrainian artists provided an urgent artistic response which explored subjects of conflict, memory and individual loss. The PinchukArtCentre was a platform for artists to be both critical and non-partisan, and for audiences to discuss Ukraine's future while remembering and reflecting on identity and losses.

In 2015, a new way of thinking had arrived to Ukraine and civil society seemed to be stronger than ever before. But at the same time the country was at risk, facing external aggression and an internal fight against vested interests and destabilizing forces.

In 2015, PinchukArtCentre has through its education and exhibition program, tried to formulate: what Ukraine is, where it came from, what it hopes to be and needs to face. It has allowed artists to contribute to the discourse on their country, and provided them with a platform to be critical ambassadors of a new country in the making.

2015's first chapter has been the national pavilion of Ukraine during the 56th Venice Biennial, supported and organized by the PinchukArtCentre and the Victor Pinchuk Foundation. Organizing the national pavilion meant the responsibility for presenting a country that promised change to the world, but needs the world's help to survive. And yet it also meant presenting a feeling shared throughout the country: "Hope!". We projected a temporal, completely transparent glass pavilion on the Riva dei Sette Martiri. It stood for the hopes for a new Ukraine, a country that is transparent and actively reaches out to the world. Our selection of seven young Ukrainian artists, most of whom have been supported by the PinchukArtCentre throughout its existence, was a choice for a new generation. Their practice is defined by a critical attitude, dealing with urgent concrete situations that impact society as a whole.

While we faced the present in Venice, we invested into exploring Ukrainian history and identity at the PinchukArtCentre in Kyiv. With the exhibition Borderline, we presented the first curated historical exhibition of Ukrainian contemporary art. The show explored the development of Ukrainian art from the early 1980s till 2004 (year of the Orange Revolution). Borderline sparked discourse throughout the country on how to appreciate and understand the generation of artists who emerged during the early 1980ies and 1990ies. For the first time, Ukrainian contemporary art was not classified by formal appreciations. Instead, it searched for meanings that allowed identifying unifying driving forces within art and society of the time.

The final chapter of 2015 confirmed our strong commitment to fostering and interlinking Ukrainian and international art of the new generation. The fourth edition of the PinchukArtCentre Prize presented new works of 16 Ukrainian artists, and accentuated how the emerging Ukrainian art scene has gained in the last 6 years international respect and relevance.

At the same time, PinchukArtCentre presented, through the brave exhibition Patriots, Citizens, Lovers... by Carlos Motta (winner of the Future Generation Art Prize 2014), a look at ourselves, at problems in Ukrainian society that have been hidden too long. Motta gave voice to 11 Ukrainian citizens of the LGBTI community, who have been excluded and stigmatized throughout their life. Combined with his iconic installation We Who Feel Differently (2012), the exhibition offered a touching statement and put into a historical and global context a Ukrainian issue that affects so many.

PinchukArtCentre has throughout 2015 transformed together with the country while keeping its core mission. It changed from an institution that nurtured civil society to an art center providing a critical and reflective voice within civil society and supporting Ukraine in the world.

**CRADLES OF HOPE:
NEONATAL CENTERS,
SAVING LIVES AND
CONTRIBUTING
TO MODERNIZING
UKRAINE’S HEALTH
CARE SYSTEM**

— In order to curb infant mortality in Ukraine and modernize the country’s deficient neonatal health care system, the Victor Pinchuk Foundation has been developing its “Cradles of Hope” program since 2006. A network of state-of-the-art neonatal centers has been established, based in existing state hospitals throughout Ukraine. The foundation provides high-tech medical equipment, trainings for staff, and IT networks.

32 centers have since been opened (and refurbished with new equipment when needed); over 35 000 babies have been saved. Over 1000 doctors and medical workers were provided with cutting-edge knowledge at conferences and trainings.

The Medsanbat project emerged after several months of military actions in Eastern Ukraine. The numbers of wounded and killed made it clear that existing Ukrainian military medicine lacks basic knowledge and skills of first aid in emergency situations. On the battlefield and during all stages of evacuation, a decisive period for people wounded in battle, proper care was not provided due to the lack of knowledge, vital medical supplies and instruments. As a result, the numbers of deaths, fatal injuries and handicapped were rocketing.

Victor and Elena Pinchuk developed the project to address this problem and in early October 2014 Medsanbat was launched to respond to this gap. The project was designed to provide trainings on tactical medicine according to NATO standards to doctors, medical personnel, volunteers and soldiers, and to supply doctors in the combat zone with fully equipped medical backpacks.

Until the end of 2015, Medsanbat has trained more than 5,000 people in 40 trainings in all parts of Ukraine, including the combat zone. 150 doctors and medical professionals were equipped with backpacks during this period with the pledge to refill all used supplies.

A substantial number of those who underwent the trainings work now in the ATO zone - as doctors, volunteers and soldiers, many are in the front lines working in all segments of medical aid, from first aid to the wounded to evacuation in main hospitals in Ukraine.

In 2015, with the assistance of Medsanbat new National Standards of training Ukrainian army combat medics were developed and published.



Medsanbat paid special attention to develop capacities of government structures: in 2015 professors of medical colleges and universities, along with a trainers team from the Military and Medical Academy of Ukraine, were trained as teachers on combat medicine. Medsanbat also trained trainers for the new Kyiv police force.

Moreover, in 2015 Medsanbat launched three video clips on the medsanbat.info web site. They are aimed at informing civilians about how to act when the threat of military actions occurs. The goal is to help curbing the great number of civil victims of conflict.

Ukrainian Philanthropic Marketplace is a platform for online giving, made possible by a startup grant from the Victor Pinchuk Foundation.

The web-based platform ubb.org.ua links social projects with donors and business.

Since 2012, it has pioneered quick, efficient, transparent and accountable giving in Ukraine. Hundreds of thousands of citizens have come together to achieve big results with small contributions.

In 2015, ubb.org.ua raised over ten times more funds than the amount spent on its infrastructure. Raised funds were directed to more than 120 Ukrainian NGO's - saving thousands of lives, providing, among others, surgery and treatment to children with serious diseases, vacations for orphans, medical equipment and support for refugees from Eastern Ukraine, injured soldiers and destroyed cities.

Verification and transparency are an important feature. Only after thorough verification, Ukrainian NGOs can place their projects on ubb.org.ua. This is crucial in Ukraine where for many years there has been a fear of misappropriation of donations. Ensuring transparency and accountability, the platform allows citizens to feel confident that their donations will directly help those in need. Also, the Ukrainian Philanthropic Marketplace consults companies on how to build transparent and effective philanthropic projects as part of their corporate social responsibility strategies.

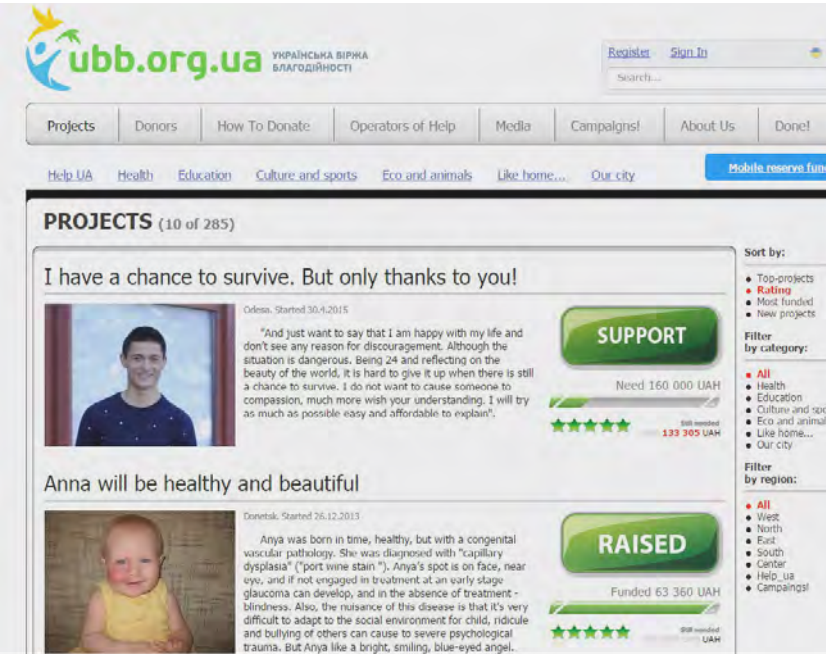
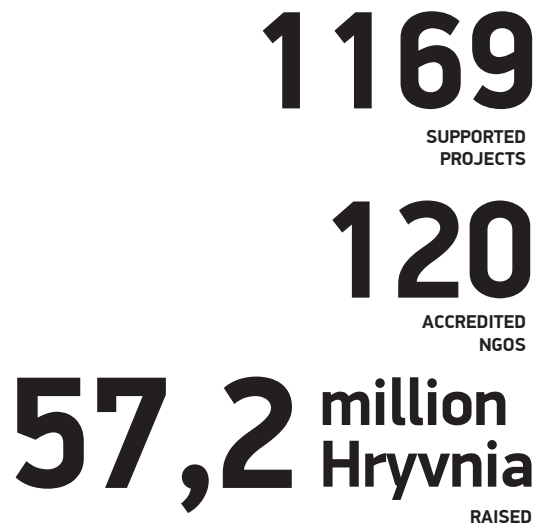

Each year, the panelists discuss a focal area or innovative instrument that may allow philanthropy to go to new levels, become more effective, transparent, and impactful.

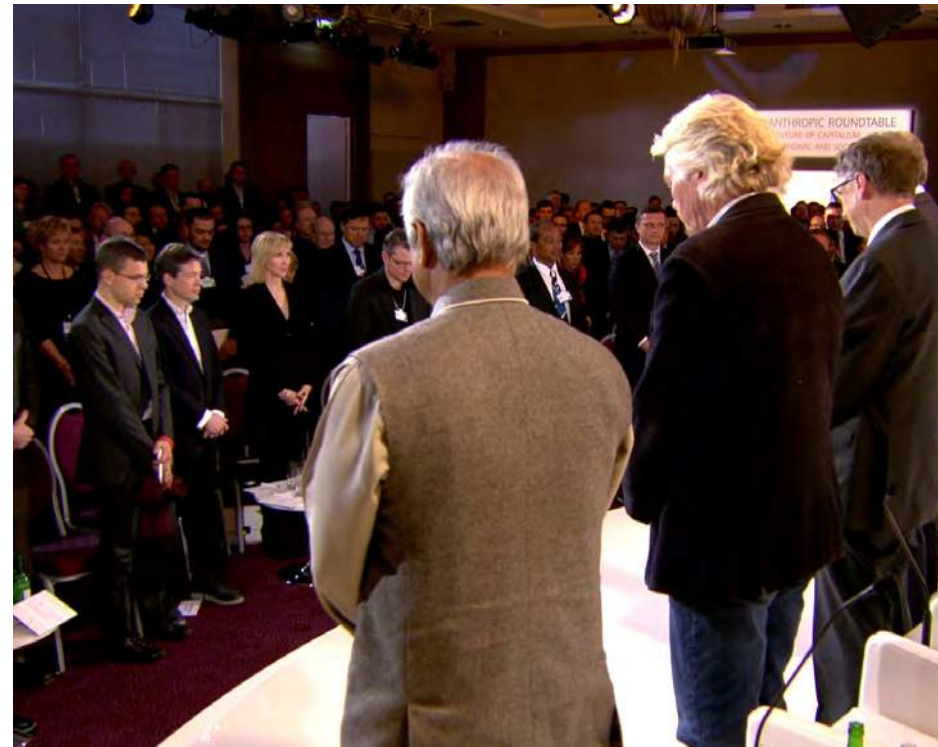

For a decade the Victor Pinchuk Foundation has been a supporter of the Jewish community in Ukraine, and contributed to raising awareness for the history of Jewish presence in Ukraine.

For his contribution to bringing Jewish and non-Jewish Ukrainians closer together and his support for Jewish communities in Ukraine, Victor Pinchuk received the Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky Award in 2014. The Sheptytsky Award is conferred by the Jewish Confederation of Ukraine and the Ukrainian Jewish Encounter on an annual basis to an individual in Ukraine, Israel, or from the diasporas who has made important contributions to Ukrainian-Jewish understanding and cooperation.

The foundation has contributed to the Dnipropetrovsk Jewish community, among others to programs for the younger generation, e.g. the “Beth Khana” college, the Joseph and Fanny Tsindlikht private pre-school, school number 144. Also the foundation contributed to the “Home for the elderly,” “Beit Barukh.”

In 2006, a documentary about the Holocaust in Ukraine, “Spell Your Name”, was co-produced by Steven Spielberg and Victor Pinchuk with the USC Shoah Foundation Institute. In 2011 and 2012, the exhibition “Shoah by Bullets: Mass Shootings of Jews in Ukraine 1941-1944” was shown in Kyiv, Kharkiv and Dnipropetrovsk in partnership with Mémorial de la Shoah and Yahad-In Unum.

The Tony Blair Faith Foundation (TBFF) is an international partner of the Victor Pinchuk Foundation that fosters tolerance and religious understanding in Ukraine and worldwide.

Through its innovative university and schools programs, TBFF provides practical support to help future leaders work to combat religious prejudice, conflict, and extremism.

The Faith and Globalization Teaching Network provides universities across the globe with the resources to help students understand religion’s role in the modern world. The National University of Kyiv Mohyla Academy is an active partner of the Faith and Globalization network. From 2011 to 2015 90 students enrolled in the Sociology of Religion courses, elements about faith and globalization were included into the existing course and a special video resource was created to deliver these courses.

The second program, Face to Faith equips young people aged 12 to 17 with the knowledge and skills to be resolute in the face of negative influence and more open to the diversity of the world. The number of Ukrainian schools registered in this program accounts up to 65, the teachers are using the Face to Faith pedagogy and materials with their 3600 plus students.

Ukrainian classes have made 54 global connections in 2015 through team blogging and facilitated video conferences. They have made over 160 global connections on the programme since 2012. Connections have been made between classes in Ukraine and classes in 17 other countries across Asia, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas.

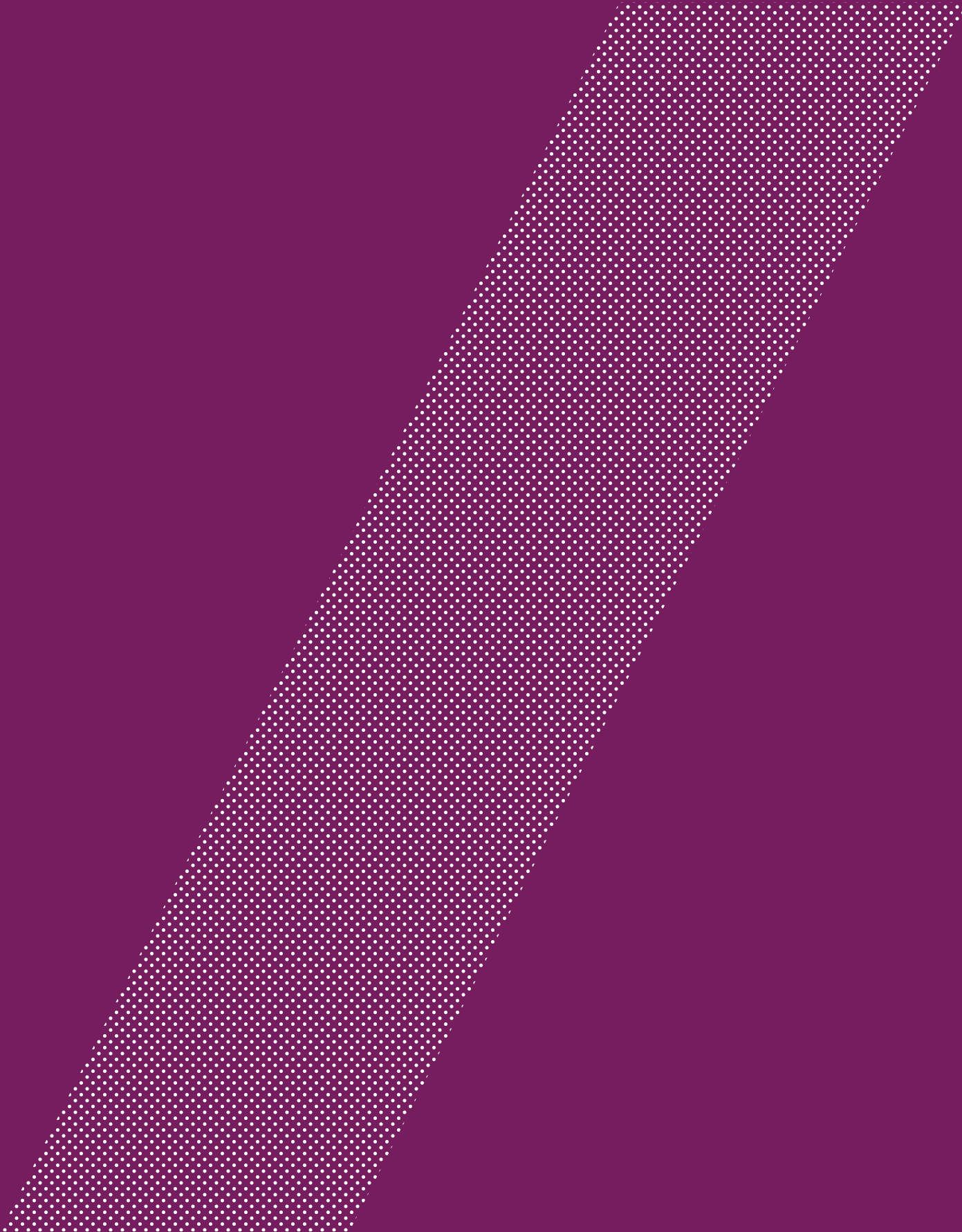
The “Human rights and justice” program initiative of the International Renaissance Foundation fights poverty and social exclusion by providing free primary legal aid to the most vulnerable and marginalized members of society in Ukraine. The program offers financial support to projects providing legal advice, information and consultations to vulnerable groups. The legal centers provide mediation services to prevent conflicts and help communities solve legal disputes outside of court, thus saving time and financial resources. Consultations can be also provided online. Since 2015 the legal centers started working in cooperation with government-funded legal aid centers. If needed, the centers contribute to coordination between institutions to improve the interaction between government, local self-governmental bodies and citizens.

The Victor Pinchuk Foundation provided support for this program from its inception until 2012.

YES and its Annual Meeting provide the leading platform for discussing Ukraine's European future and global position, and for shaping strategies for wider Europe. YES connects Ukraine to international partners, supports forces for change in Ukraine, and builds networks of supporters for a new Ukraine worldwide.

For over a decade, YES has consistently engaged in dialog representatives from Ukraine, the EU, the Russian Federation, the US and the world. Within Ukraine, it has always given a platform for government and opposition, as well as leaders from business and the social, expert and media sphere.

YES started in 2004, when Victor Pinchuk invited some 30 European leaders to debate the future of Ukraine and the EU. Until today, it has developed into the leading platform for public diplomacy in Ukraine and the region. For the past years, the international Supervisory Board governing its activities has included Aleksander Kwaśniewski (President of Poland (1995-2005), Chairman of the YES Supervisory Board), Pat Cox (President of the European Parliament (2002-2004)), Mario David (Vice President of the European People's Party), Stephane Fouks (Vice President of Havas Group, Executive Co-Chairman of Havas Worldwide), Victor Pinchuk, Alexander Rahr, Jean-Pierre Saltiel (President of Rothschild Conseil International (1998-2004)), Marek Siwiec, (Vice-President of the European Parliament (2007-2009), MEP (2004-2014)), Javier Solana (Secretary General of NATO (1995-1999), High Representative for Common Foreign and Security Policy of the European Union (1999-2009)).

YES has hosted an Annual Meeting since 2004, which has evolved into the leading conference in Ukraine and the region. It was held from 2004 to 2013 at the symbolic Livadia Palace in Yalta. This venue was chosen to turn the place where in 1945 Europe was divided at the Yalta Conference, into a place to create impulses for uniting Wider Europe. In 2014, after the annexation of Crimea by the Russian Federation, the YES Annual Meeting moved to Mystetskyi Arsenal in the Ukrainian capital Kyiv.

Connecting Ukraine and the world is a crucial part of the foundation's approach to foster transformation. One instrument for putting Ukraine on the international agenda and bringing together Ukrainian and international leaders is the Davos Ukrainian Lunch. It has been hosted as a private event at the occasion of the Davos Annual Meeting of the World Economic Forum since 2005. At the first event, around 40 participants engaged in a discussion with leading representatives of Ukraine's government and opposition. Since then, it has evolved into a leading annual gathering to discuss Ukraine's future with world leaders.

Over more than 10 years, the Davos Ukrainian Lunch has managed to bring together representatives of the Ukrainian government and opposition, as well as representatives of the EU and the Russian Federation, in a consistent attempt to keep dialog lines open and discuss transparently and with an open mind. Around 200 leaders from business, politics, the NGO sector, and the media attend the event.

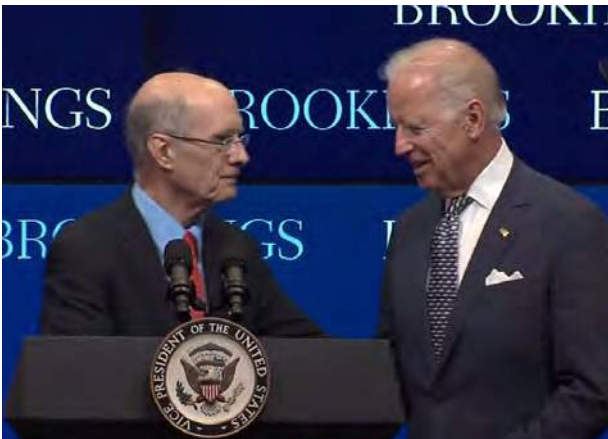

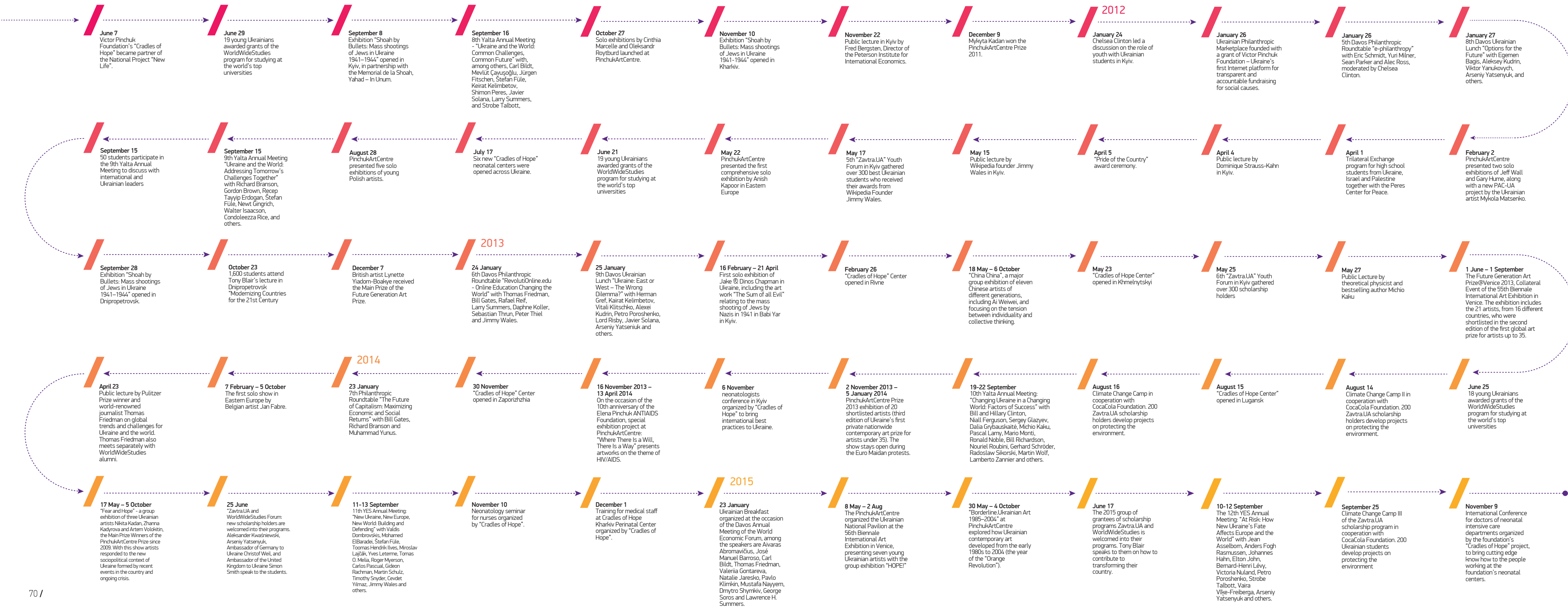

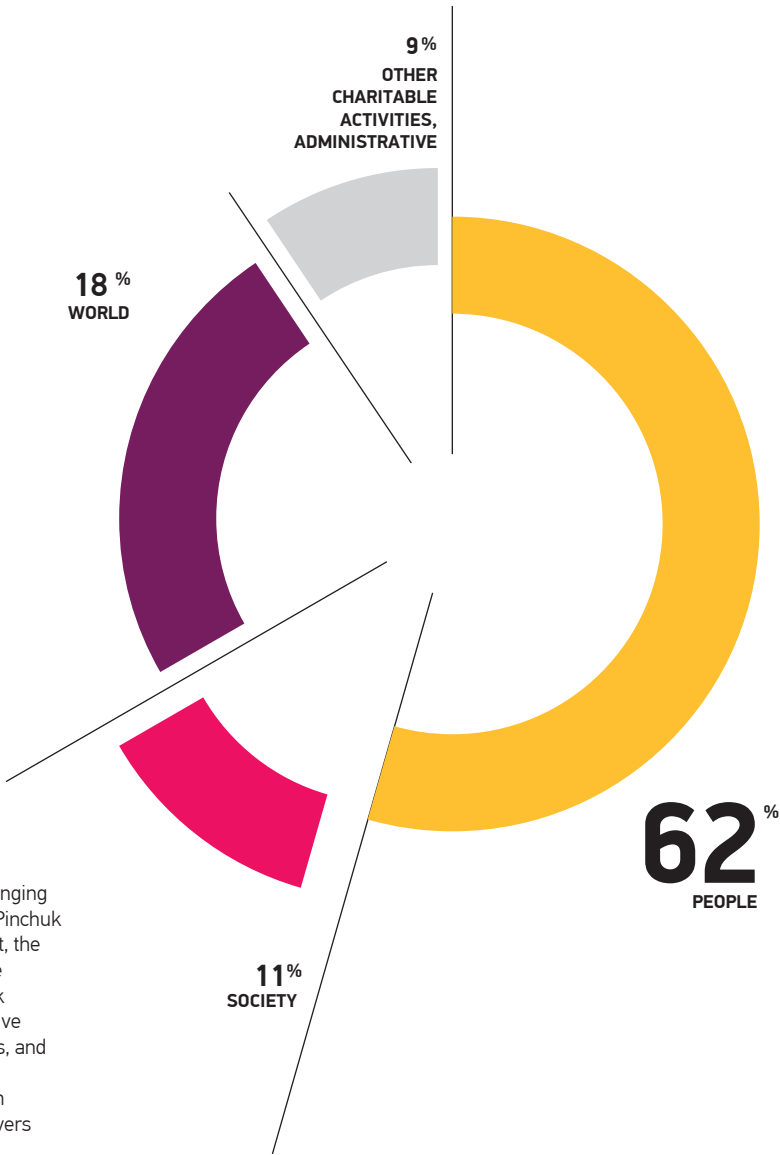

The Victor Pinchuk Foundation was established in 2006, bringing together the various lines of philanthropic activities Victor Pinchuk had been developing over the previous 10 years. At present, the Victor Pinchuk Foundation combines two legal entities: one not-for-profit UK entity, "The UK Office of the Victor Pinchuk Foundation", which serves as the international representative office and facilitates the Foundation's international activities, and one charitable not-for-profit organization registered under Ukrainian charitable law (Ukrainian Charitable Organisation "Foundation of Victor Pinchuk – Social Initiative"), which covers different activities in Ukraine.

All activities of the above foundations, hereinafter collectively referred to as "The Victor Pinchuk Foundation", are governed by one management team. Reporting to the founder on an annual basis, management prepares a combined statement of cash receipts and disbursements, which presents the cash receipts and disbursements of these two foundations, together with a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information ("the Combined Statement"). Such annual combined statements for the period 2006-2014 have been audited by Ernst & Young Audit Services LLC.

The Foundations receive donations primarily from legal entities for the purpose of funding various charitable and social projects and making charitable donations.

*The combined statement for 2015 will be issued later in the year after its audit is completed.
